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PASTOR NOTES FOR JULY 2021: Enjoying the Ride?

Our summer/fall series "What's Your Hurry? The Immediate Impact of Mark's Gospel for Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow" kicked off on June 6. Mark moves the action forward quickly and urgently. Mark wants us all to get that the message of the good news that Jesus is God's son come to bring salvation is something to believe right now...today...immediately!



I hope you're enjoying the ride! To recap where we've been:

First, we looked at just the first verse, <u>Mark 1:1</u> and asked: What, for you is the most urgent, important and immediate message of the Gospel? What is it for the world around you?

Next, we looked at <u>Mark 1: 9-45</u> and found Jesus - after a long few days taking time to rest and pray. We asked: What's our prayer life like? Do we take the time we need to rest and pray and just be with God, listening to God's direction for our lives? We were encouraged to try to stop three times a day to pray. Have you tried it? Has it changed you from the inside?

Then we looked at <u>Mark 2: 1-17</u> and saw many instances of people standing up and moving forward. Taking a stand for themselves and for others. We see Jesus - who always stands up for sinners and welcomes them into God's Kingdom. It is for sinners, after all, why He came. We asked many questions: For whom and for what are we asked to take a stand - as Christians? As a church? In what ways has sin held you down and made you unable to move? In what ways have you been freed from the burden of sin through the power of forgiveness in Christ? What sins are we convinced will forever identify us? From what might we stand up and move away from - choosing instead to follow Jesus? Do we believe that Jesus sits and eats with sinners - or might we feel that some are not fully invited to the table?

Finally we looked at Mark 3: 1-34 and saw Jesus drawing together a new family of faith in God. We asked: What does it mean for us to belong to the family of God and how do we live out our family life in the church? How are we mothers and fathers, sisters and brothers to one another?

All great questions! Find a notebook and jot down some answers. Re-read the chapters and see what else you discover. What other questions come to you as you do. Keep an on-going journal to write down your questions, discoveries – and your prayers, too.

Coming next in July:

July 4: Mark 4: 35-41 (Ask: How do you handle the storms of life?") July 11: Mark 5: 21-43 (Ask: How do you handle times of waiting for Jesus to show up?) July 18 - Mark 6: 1-12; 30-44 (Ask: What about the Gospel is offensive to others? Even to us?)

I encourage us all to keep reading along with Mark as our journey through his wonderful Gospel continues. As you do, read slowly, taking in every word. In your journal, write down your questions and take notes of things that "pop out" at you. What and who do you meet? What do you hear and see? How does the reading make you feel - and make you think? Enjoy! And remember - you'll get the most of this series by joining with us on Thursdays at 6:00 in Taylor Hall for our Bible study together! All are welcome to take a seat around the table.

We have so many ways to join in and grow your faith!!


- ⇒ Join in for an Adult Bible Study on Thursday evenings from 6-7:30.

Dear Buckingham Friends,

I've found the most informative new website, Newspapers.com. I did a search of "Buckingham Presbyterian" in the Baltimore Sun and Democratic messenger starting in the 1850's. Apparently the Messenger wasn't in existence until the 1880's, as the earliest article I found there is dated April 1888. It is the obituary of BPC Elder Littleton P. Franklin.

Death of Littleton P. Franklin. Littleton P. Franklin, Esq., one of Worcester's most highly respected citizens, died at his residence in Berlin, on Monday last, after a short illness of typhoid pneumonia. The news of his death was received here with much sorrow, for the people of Snow Hill recognized in him a true, upright and honest man. He was one of the Elders of Buckingham Presbyterian Church of Berlin, which office he had faithfully filled for many years. During his life he had filled many offices of trust, and represented his native county on more than one occasion. He was a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1867, and served one term in the House ot Delegates, after which he was elected State Senator, which office he filled with great credit to himself and constituency. At the time of his death he was a member of the Democratic State Central Committee of this county, having been chosen last year to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. Hilliary Pitts. In his death the church looses a most earnest supporter, the county a valuable citizen and the Democratic party one of its brightest lights. He leaves a wife and four children.

The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock and his remains were followed to their last resting place, in Buckingham Cemetery, by a very large number of people many of whom came from distant parts of the county. The Baptist Church in Berlin is nearing completion. There was a large attendance at the dedication on the 21st of May.

The Methodists have commenced the improvements on their church. The building will be raised another story and a handsome tower built in front.

The date for completeing the painting of the Buckingham Presbyterian Church has not yet been fixed. It will soon be too warm to finish the work. Painters tell us that frame buildings should not be painted in hot weather.

Miss Virgalyn Warrington has returned from a pleasant visit to her sister in Washington.

Mr. Calvin B. Taylor and wife attended the Commencement Exercises of the Snow Hill High School on Wednesday evening and were highly pleased with the programme.

The Messenger article [above right] discuses other churches in Berlin and the paint project at BPC. This would have been before the great Berlin fire of October 1904 when the church burned to the ground. The cornerstone for our present building was laid in 1905.
