How Do You "Unglue" the Average Church?

In April, the New Castle Presbytery started a church revitalization program for interested congregations called "Unglued Church" and about 33% of all churches in the presbytery signed up. The program hopes to apply the insights of a consulting group and the new Vital Congregations movement in the PCUSA to the context of the local church. By participating in New Castle's program, I'm learning a lot about how Buckingham might be able to approach its future challenges in a thoughtful and deliberate manner. As you might imagine from the name of the program, the effort is designed to help local leaders and ministers to examine every part of their church program and then reassemble everything in a more focused, effective way. Goals and methods that made sense in the 1950s do not necessarily make sense today. And the nature of change must be more than piecemeal. New ideas must emerge from "outside the box." As someone who has participated in several church-wide "new beginnings" processes in the past, I am impressed with the exercises and discussions so far. Below I have summarized and paraphrased the questions churches are asking themselves:

- 1. Who are we? (Marks of a vital congregation, vital statistics)
- 2. Who are we? (Appreciative inquiry, history of congregation)
- 3. Who is our neighbor? (MissionInsite analysis into demographics and religious preferences of local residents)
- 4. Community exegesis (Consultants visit church onsite)
- 5. Why should we reach our neighbor? (checking motivations)
- 6. How do we reach our neighbor? (writing down possible plans)
- 7. What will be our focus in the short-term? What will be our goal in the long-term?

One of the consultants, Sue Rothenberg, explains the three parts of the process: "(1) Developing a clear picture of the congregation and its resources/challenges/history/financial status, as well as the "essential DNA" that must be carried into the future, (2) Developing a clear picture of the community served by the church, and (3) Moving to understand and innovate adaptive ways for the church to move forward into God's future story for them."

How we can take advantage of this program? Well, 1) we can consider joining the next cohort in March of 2020. The Session will be looking at this in the new year. And 2) we can have some of these conversations in the 9 months before we join the cohort. These are some excellent questions for discussion right now. As our PNC researches the needs of the congregation, these questions can help guide that research.

So be prepared to share your perspectives in the coming months! We have a number of surveys to complete and a number of discussions to host. Although we might be tempted to take these surveys and conversations lightly, these opportunities are very important for all future plans for Buckingham Presbyterian Church.

We are going to have a lot to talk about in the next 9 months! So join the conversation.



A Note from Historian Lynne Murray

In the June edition of the Gram, I discussed an 1839 purchase of land in Berlin by a committee representing the church. Several of the committee members are buried in Buckingham cemetery, the earliest headstone being that of John Fassitt, 1773 to 1846. That 1839 deed as being in the village of Parlin called Purloy but it's specific location was unclear.

described the property as being in the village of Berlin called Burley but it's specific location was unclear.

Sally Kohler had given me some BPC documents and one of them is the deed for the purchase of the property on which the church currently stands. We know from I. Marshall Page's book, *Old Buckingham by the Sea*, that our last church building to exist on the cemetery property at the end of South Main Street collapsed in January 1857. That brick building had been erected in 1784 when Berlin was quite small and most attendees lived on farms. By the mid-1850's, many members were town folk who found walking that distance to be a burden. There was strong sentiment for moving the church into town but equally strong sentiment by rural residents opposing the move. To accommodate those having to walk to church a lecture hall had been maintained in the town for some years. On the night of Saturday, January 18, 1857 this dilemma was solved by blizzard conditions from a storm of rare ferocity. Strong winds blew for many hours and snow accumulation was such that the weight of it caused the church roof to collapse. Marshall Page further states that the property in town for the new church was purchased from John H. Marshall. A copy of that document is quoted here:

"This deed made this thirtieth day of April in the year eighteen hundred and fifty-seven by John E. H. Marshall and Laura Ann Marshall his wife of Worcester County in the state of Maryland, witnesseth that in consideration of four hundred and fifty dollars the said John E. H. Marshall and Laura Ann Marshall his wife do grant unto the Committee of the Presbyterian Congregation of Buckingham & their successors, in trust for the Presbyterian Congregation of Buckingham, of said county and state, all that tract or parcel of ground, situated in the town of Berlin in the said county and state, Bounded as follows - On the East by the Main Street passing through the town of Berlin, on the South and West by the lot of ground belonging to the Estate of Dr James R. S. Purnell deceased, attached to the dwelling in which the said Dr James R. S. Purnell was residing at the time of his death & on the North by the Parsonage lot of the Methodist Episcopal church, the lot of ground hereby conveyed being all that part of a tract of land conveyed to said Laura Ann Marshall by Elisha L. Purnell in two deeds one dated the ninth day of October eighteen hundred and forty-one, recorded in the records of Worcester County in Liber [etc.], the other dated the eighteenth day of March eighteen hundred and forty, recorded in Liber [etc.], which lies upon the west side of the Main Street aforesaid in fee simple, Provided that if at any time a majority of said committee shall authorize any burial or interment within the ground hereby conveys then & in that case this deed is to become null and void and the lot herein conveyed shall revert back to John E. H. Marshall and Laura Ann Marshall their heirs and assigns in the same manner as if this deed had never been made."

Signed by John E. H. Marshall and Laura Ann Marshall. Witness' name is unclear.

Clearly, John Marshall sought to guarantee that no burials take place on this new church property!
