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PASTOR NOTES FOR SEPTEMBER 2021: A Time to Abide in Faith, Hope and Especially Love

For now, we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love. (1 Corinthians 13:12-13)

As I sit to write these notes for September, my heart is burdened by the weight of the news of the bomb attacks at the Kabul airport in Afghanistan. At this writing, we are aware that many people have been hurt or have died - including several American Marines. The situation is dire and spiraling more and more out of control every day. Fingers of blame are being pointed left and right. War and injustice and divisions everywhere tear away at the already fragile fabric of the human family. There seems to be no end in sight to the nightmare. World peace seems to be a pipe dream.

We were already fragile in the throws of the COVID pandemic, with its ebbs and flows of infection and progression. Some ask: Should these masks stay on or should they go? How do we know for sure if vaccinations are working or safe? How serious is the Delta variant? Should we be asking all of this with some modicum of skepticism, or should we just look to the filled hospital beds in over

75% of ICU units across the nation and the healthcare staff working tirelessly in them?

Add to these concerns earthquakes and hurricanes which have rattled the already devastated country of Haiti, fires in our Western states and floods along our coast and other places where nature and human violence wreaks havoc on creation, it is safe and sorrowful to say that the burdens of the world are heavy right now. Perhaps heavier than they have ever been. If you are like me (a.k.a. a human being) - you may wonder sometimes: What does God have in mind in such a time as this?

Closer to home, in August our church lost two cherished long-term members in just two weeks' time: Howard Cathall and Bill Smith. We all stand with their families in their mourning and offer prayers for their comfort. In such a time as this, some also begin to feel the pain of wondering what God has in store for our church as we are losing our connections to the generations. These losses come hard and are felt deeply in our hearts.

In such times as these, where do we turn for solace? For comfort? For hope?

Well, if you're like me (a.k.a. an imperfect follower of Jesus) hopefully you turn to prayer and to the scriptures. And while in prayer, burdened by the news of the day, lamenting, and wondering what God could possibly have in mind in all of this, the words of Paul from First Corinthians (see above) came to me and spoke into my spirit.

The truth is, we can't always see what God has in mind. Rather, we see through life's mirror dimly - not always able to make out exactly God's will for us. We will know it - perfectly, plainly, one day on earth as it is in heaven. For now, though - we have the faith, hope and love of Jesus Christ in which we are called to **abide**.

"Abide" is a beautiful, powerful word. It means "live," but more, it means "have life." Life happens where we abide, root down, spend time and hold on. And so, Paul says we must abide - at all times: in our faith in Jesus Christ, spending time with Him in prayer and worship;

in our hope in Jesus Christ, holding on even in the darkest days, trusting in Christ to show us the way and give us vision for better days;

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and finally, in our love - for God and God's love for us. We must have faith and hope and trust that through all of life's trials, God's love never dwindles but remains strong for us.

To be clear, Paul speaks here of a special kind of love. It is *agape* love - the highest form of love. Agape is God's unfathomable love for us. It is a love that, at most times, may seem impossible for us to achieve ourselves. But in Jesus Christ - we have seen what it takes to make agape happen: Sacrifice, obedience, a focus on others above self, a willingness to set aside man-made boundaries of separation and to welcome all. It's hard, but Agape love is possible - as are all things - with God. It is also important to note that agape love is communal love - it's the love of the church community birthed into existence to exemplify the saving power of Jesus Christ - power that is rooted in God's love which abides in us.

Friends, in times like these - indeed, in every time throughout history, this is what God has in mind: For God's children to remain faithful, to hold onto our hope in Christ and to accept and share God's agape love for us. Today, let us pray for the nation of Afghanistan, it's people and our troops there; for Haiti and for relief to come; for our country, our rescue workers and our leaders to help us through every fire and storm; for an end to the COVID pandemic and for all the suffering of the world.

Let us pray for the Church - ours here at Buckingham Presbyterian and the Church universal. In our prayers, let us ask not only for the strength to abide but also for the chance to lift the heavy burdens of others. And when given the chance, let's do it with faith, hope and especially love.

A Note from Historian Lynne Murray

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These charming articles from the late 1890's give us a glimpse into the fund-raising pursuits of past years. The Ladies Missionary Society of BPC sponsored a "Povertie Partie." Funds were raised by charging an admission fee and imposing a fine on those wearing "extravagances in dress." Sounds like fun!

A Birthday Social will be given in the Chapel of Buckingham Presbyterian Church, Berlin, by the Ladies Home Missionary Society on May 20th from 8 to 10 P. M. Each guest will be expected to drop an amount equivalent in pennies to the number of his or her years of age into a bag presented at the door. The amount need be known to no one but the donor. Cake and lemonade will be served and music and children's fancy drills furnished by way of entertainment. All are cordially invited. Come and we will try to insure you a pleasant evening. The proceeds of the social will be used to provide more brilliant lights for the church.

The ladies held a fair and festival in a Main Street location to help pay for new carpet at the church. The items offered for sale probably included needlework by the ladies and possibly a white elephant sale.

It's worth noting that these events took place before the great Berlin fire of 1904 when BPC burned to the ground. The two previous articles speak of events taking place in the *Chapel* at church. Perhaps it was unable to accommodate the fair event.

A "Povertie Partie" is expected to be held by the Ladies Missionary Society of Buckingham Presbyterian Church, in the chapel adjoining the church, on Tuesday evening, June 11th, from 7 to 10 o'clock, 15 cents will be charged for admission, for which each visitor will receive a ticket entitling him or her to ice cream and cake. Fines of from 1 to 5 cents will be imposed for extravagances in dress, which will be specified in notices put up in town and also sent to the private houses. It is hoped that an evening of pleasure and profit will be the result of the Partie.



To raise money for new church lighting the ladies sponsored a "Birthday Social." Each person was asked to contribute pennies equal to their age; unanimously of course! Cake and lemonade were served.
