

PASTOR NOTES FOR OCTOBER 2021: TIME TO FALL ... FORWARD

Friends, the time has come. It always does. It's autumn. It's time to make our clocks "fall back" an hour. The time to watch the sun setting earlier and earlier. The time to pull out the coats from storage and let them air out a bit to get them ready to wear in the coming cooler weather. For some fall comes as a relief from summer's heat; for others, it's a time to hunker down and hibernate until spring flowers pop again, signs of life after winter's end. [Special Dispatch to the Baltimore Sun.] SNOW HILL, MD., Dec. 22 .- Miss Louisa Richardson Franklin, of Berlin, and Mr. Robley D. Jones, of Snow Hill, were marride in Buckingham Presbyterian Church, in Berlin, this morning at half-past 6 by Rev. Arthur Dougall. The bride wore green broadcloth, trimmed with velvet and jet, also a magnificent brooch of diamonds and pearls, a gift from the groom. She carried a large bouquet of La France roses.

The organist was Miss Addie Henry. The ushers were Dr. Thomas Y. Franklin and Mr. William C. Franklin and Messrs. William E. Bratten and William C. Powell, of Snow Hill. Mr. and Mrs. Jones took the early north-bound train for a wedding tour. They will live in Snow Hill. Mrs. Jones is the youngest daughter of the late Littleton P. Franklin, one of the bestknown citizens of the Eastern Shore, and Mr. Jones is one of the most prominent members of the Worcester bar and is now serving his second term as State's attorney for this county. Notwithstanding the early morning hour the church was filled with friends, many of whom had come from a distance to attend the marriage.

hosting three weddings, deemed important enough by the Baltimore Sun to appear in their Berlin News. On page 8 of the December 22, 1897 issue of the Sun, the wedding of Miss Louisa Richardson Franklin to State's Attorney Robley D. Jones (at 6:30 in the morning!) was reported in considerable detail. Miss Franklin is described as the youngest daughter of the late State Senator Littleton P. Franklin. The Senator was the nephew of Louisa Franklin Richardson and cousin of her daughter, Lady Kortright, the benefactress of our Chapel. The Franklins chose to name their daughter in honor of Littleton's Aunt Louisa, who remembered her namesake guite generously in her will.

In December 1897 Buckingham was notable for

The obituary of the groom, Robley Jones, reports he was serving as an Associate Judge of the First Maryland Judicial Circuit at the time of his death in July 1917. Louisa outlived Robley by many years and died in Philadelphia in 1940. Louisa's great -grandfather Isaac Franklin can be found on page 64 of Old Buckingham by the Sea. He was elected a BPC Elder in December 1801.



#### The two Berlin weddings reported in the Baltimore Sun on December 23, 1897 didn't receive the coverage of the Franklin-Jones nuptials the day before, but the wedding of Clara Davis and Alexander Baird sounds guite lovely. The church was decorated with potted plants and a central arch; I wonder if the arch was placed before the altar table? The bride wore light blue satin and carried a bouquet of carnations and hyacinths.

The wedding of Miss Dellie Rayne to Mr. Albert Warren barely receives any mention at all. Rev. Arthur Dougal of Buckingham performed all three ceremonies.

#### Two Weddings At Berlin.

[Special Dispatch to the Baltimore Sun.] BERLIN, MD., Dec. 23 .- Mr. Alexander R. Baird, of Columbia, Pa., and Miss Clara Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Davis, of Trappe, were married at half-past 7 this evening in the Buckingham Presbyterian Church. Rev. Arthur Dougal, pastor of the church, performed the ceremony. The church was beautifully trimmed with potted plants and a central arch. The flower girls were Misses Helen Dirickson, Blanche Walston, May Purnell and Stella Hearn. The ushers were the Messrs. J. Edward Evans, Theodore Hanley, John D. Rayne and Ernest Burbage. The bride wore light blue satin and carried a bouquet of carnations and hyacinths. A large reception was held at the home of the bride's parents after the wedding. After their wedding tour they will reside at Columbia, Pa.

At the Presbyterian Church last evening, by the Rev. Arthur Dougal, Mr. Albert W. Warren and Miss Dellie K. Rayne, both of Ironshire, Md., were married.
